Chindo Viburnum

VIBURNUM AWABUKI 'CHINDO'

Lush, glossy leaves and clusters of fragrant white blooms in spring, and bright red berries in fall, Viburnum species have a history in folk medicine to treat cramps and spasms.

Chinese Evergreen Oak

QUERCUS MYRSINIFOLIA

Lance-shaped leaves that stay glossy green year-round, this oak is native to Asia. Other oak species have been used to treat wounds due to their high tannin content, which acts as an astringent.

Fringe Tree

CHIONANTHUS VIRGINICUS

Also known as "Old Man's Beard" for its wispy, fringe-like white flowers, this plant is native to Georgia. The bark and root were traditionally used as a remedy for liver and gallbladder issues.

Gulfstream Nandina

NANDINA DOMESTICA 'GULFSTREAM'

Compact, evergreen shrub that changes color with the seasons, this plant is also known as Sacred Bamboo and has been used in feng shui for its protective qualities. Berries can contain compounds that are toxic to birds and animals.

Japanese Stewartia

STEWARTIA PSEUDOCAMELLIA

With its exfoliating bark, lovely white flowers and stunning autumn foliage, this plant has cultural significance in Japan, where it is associated with tranquility and balance.

Nuttall Oak

QUERCUS TEXANA

Also known as Texas Red Oak, the Nuttall is a fast-growing, deciduous tree native to the southeastern United States. Oak bark was commonly used in poultices for wounds, sores, and skin irritations, and oak tea was used to treat digestive issues by indigenous peoples.

Red Drift Rose

ROSA 'RED DRIFT'

This compact rose variety produces clusters of small, vibrant red flowers that bloom continuously from spring through frost.

Rhododendron

RHODODENDRON SPP.

A stunning, broadleaf evergreen or deciduous shrub known for its showy, bell-shaped flowers that come in an array of vibrant colors.

Sasanqua Camellia

CAMELLIA SASANQUA

A versatile evergreen shrub known for its delicate, fragrant blooms that appear in late fall and early winter, Camellia sasanqua is related to Camellia sinensis, the plant used to produce tea.

Serviceberry

AMELANCHIER ARBOREA

Also known as Shadbush, it's known for its delicate white flowers that bloom in early spring, often before the leaves emerge, making it one of the first signs of the season.

Weeping Japanese Maple

ACER PALMATUM 'RED WEEPING'

Known for its brilliant red foliage, this striking small tree is prized for its cascading branches and finely cut, lace-like leaves. Cultivated in Japan for centuries, the vibrant autumn foliage is celebrated during Momijigari, the tradition of enjoying the changing colors of fall leaves.

Creeping Gardenia

GARDENIA JASMINOIDES 'RADICANS'

A low-growing, spreading shrub that produces beautifully fragrant white flowers, much like its larger Gardenia relatives. Gardenias have been revered in traditional Chinese medicine for their anti-inflammatory, sedative and fever-reducing properties.

Soft Caress Mahonia

MAHONIA 'SOFT CARESS'

Unlike traditional cultivars, this one is thornless and features soft, fine-textured leaves and bright yellow, fragrant flower clusters that bloom in late fall through winter, followed by blue berries in the spring.

Artemisia

ARTEMISIA SPP.

Known for its silvery, aromatic foliage and delicate texture, this plant has been highly valued for its medicinal properties in traditional European, Asian and Native American medicine. Artemisia absinthium, commonly known as Wormwood, has long been used for digestive issues, stimulating appetite and expelling intestinal parasites.

Autumn Joy Sedum

SEDUM 'AUTUMN JOY'

Starting as green broccoli-like buds in summer, its large, succulent flower heads transition to soft pink before maturing into a deep, rusty red in the fall. In traditional European herbal medicine, various Sedum species were used to treat skin conditions, wounds and burns.

Moonbeam

COREOPSIS VERTICILLATA

A delicate, airy perennial known for its profusion of soft, pale yellow, daisy-like flowers that bloom from early summer to fall. Some species of this plant were used to create yellow and orange dyes.

Mums

CHRYSANTHEMUM

With flowers ranging from red, yellow, orange and pink to white, and growing in forms from daisy-like to pompom shapes, Chrysanthemum tea is made from dried flowers and believed to have cooling properties often used to reduce fever, calm the nerves and support eye health.

Pink Dianthus

DIANTHUS SPP.

Commonly referred to as "Pinks" due to the fringed edges of their petals that resemble a pinking shear cut, these charming, low-growing perennials produce vibrant, clove-scented blooms in shades of pink, red, white, and purple, from late spring to early summer. The flowers were often infused into teas to treat digestive issues and calm anxiety in European folk medicine.

Pink & Yellow Yarrow

ACHILLEA MILLEFOLIUM

A hardy perennial known for its flat-topped clusters of long-lasting, brightly colored flowers that bloom from late spring through summer, Yarrow is named after the Greek hero, Achilles, who is said to have used Yarrow to treat soldiers' wounds during battle as a natural astringent to stop bleeding, promote healing and reduce inflammation.
